# 49% of Israelis fear anti-Semitism while traveling abroad

Poll finds 71% of Israelis believe European Jews are not safe, 91% think they should immigrate to Israel. Conference of European Rabbis calls on Jerusalem to formulate action plan to tackle anti-Semitism across continent.

Seventy-one percent of Israelis believe European Jews are not safe in their countries of residence, while 29% said they believed they were in fact safe.

Asked whether Europe's Jews should make aliyah, 91% of respondents said they should immigrate to Israel. Just 9% said they should remain where they are.

Of those surveyed, 91% of Israelis surveyed said they care about the anti-Semitic incidents taking place across Europe, while 9% said the events were of no interest to them.

Un nuevo estudio encargado por la Conferencia Europea de Rabinos, que representa a cientos de comunidades judías en todo el continente, indica que la mitad de los israelíes encuestados se preocupan por el antisemitismo durante sus vacaciones en el extranjero.

La empresa Sapio Research and Strategy realizó en abril una encuesta a 502 israelíes sobre su preocupación por el creciente antisemitismo en Europa.

La encuesta reveló que el 49% de los israelíes estaban preocupados por el antisemitismo mientras viajaban por Europa, en comparación con el 51% que dijo que no era un problema. El 55% de los padres israelíes encuestados dijeron estar preocupados por la posibilidad de un

**El 71 por ciento de los israelíes cree que los judíos europeos** no están seguros en sus países de residencia, mientras que el 29% dijo que en realidad si estaban seguros.

Al preguntárseles si los judíos de Europa deberían hacer aliyá, el **91% de los encuestados dijeron que deberían inmigrar a Israel**. Sólo el 9% dijo que deberían permanecer donde están.

De los encuestados, el 91% de los israelíes dijeron que se preocupan por los incidentes antisemitas que tienen lugar en toda Europa, mientras que el 9% dijo que los hechos no les interesaban.

En cuanto a la ayuda que el **gobierno israelí proporciona a los judíos**, sólo el 22% dijo que **Jerusalem** estaba haciendo lo suficiente para **ayudar a los judíos europeos**, el 48% dijo que estaba ayudando a los judíos de Europa en un grado moderado, y el 30% dijo que no estaba haciendo lo suficiente.

**“Los incidentes antisemitas en toda Europa son intolerables y recuerdan dolorosamente los oscuros acontecimientos del siglo pasado. Están atacando la libertad de Europa y sus valores”,** dijo la Conferencia Europea de Rabinos Presidente y Rabino Jefe de Moscú Pinchas Goldschmidt.

**“Estamos librando una lucha diaria por la libertad de religión y contra el antisemitismo y sus mensajes de odio”,** dijo.

Antes de las próximas elecciones en Israel, Goldschmidt dijo: “Pido al gobierno israelí y a los candidatos a las elecciones que consoliden una amplia estrategia de acción sobre el tema”.

*Lo studio Sapio Research and Strategy ha condotto un sondaggio su 502 israeliani sulle loro preoccupazioni per l'aumento dell'antisemitismo in Europa. La metà degli israeliani intervistati afferma di temere di incontrare l'antisemitismo durante le vacanze all'estero, secondo una ricerca commissionata dalla Conferenza europea dei rabbini, che rappresenta centinaia di comunità ebraiche in tutto il continente.*

Il sondaggio ha rilevato che il 49% degli israeliani era preoccupato per l'antisemitismo mentre viaggia in Europa. Il 71% degli israeliani ritiene che gli ebrei europei non siano al sicuro nei loro paesi di residenza.

E alla domanda se gli ebrei europei dovrebbero fare l'aliya, il 91% degli intervistati ha dichiarato che dovrebbero emigrare in Israele. Solo il 9% ha dichiarato che dovrebbero rimanere dove sono.

## Poll: Israelis Fear They'll Face Anti-Semitism on European Vacations

**YERUSHALAYIM** - As hundreds of thousands of Israelis prepare for their summer vacations, a new poll by the Conference of European Rabbis (CER) shows that nearly half of Israelis are concerned that they will experience anti-Semitism when on vacation. It's mostly on trips to Europe that they are concerned, with 71% saying that European Jews are not safe in their countries of residence.

The poll was taken of a representative sample of 502 Israelis by the Sapin polling organization on behalf of the CER. The poll shows that 49% of Israelis are concerned that they will experience anti-Semitism on their European vacations, while the rest said it was not a concern. Fifty-five percent of parents whose children were traveling in Europe said they

were concerned their children could be the victims of anti-Semitism.

In addition, 71% of Israelis said that European Jews were not safe in their countries of residence – but even if they were, 91% said that they should move to Israel. The same percentage said they were concerned or very concerned over anti-Semitic incidents in Europe. In response to whether Israel was doing enough to help European Jews, 30% said the state was doing enough, while 48% said that more needed to be done.
