Azerbaijani leadership has undertaken a policy of outreach to world Jewish leaders, continuing a centuries-old tradition of brotherly relations with the Jewish people. Mammadov, the first Ambassador to Israel, is a major player in this initiative. Several days after his arrival in Israel at the start of this year, he met with Malcolm Hoenlein, Vice Chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations.

Prior to the meeting with Hoenlein, Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev met with the President of the Conference of European Rabbis, Rabbi Pinchas Goldschmidt, in Munich. Aliyev, who has been targeted by Iranian propaganda due to his overt ties with Israel, emphasized to Goldschmidt that close relations with the Jewish people is part of "the Azerbaijani way of life."

As recently publicized, hundreds of members of the Conference of European Rabbis will arrive in Baku in mid-November for their annual summit. They will visit local synagogues and meet with representatives of different Jewish communities across the country.

Azerbaijan has seven synagogues: three in Baku, two in Quba, and two in Oghuz. A new synagogue opened in Baku in 2010, and is now one of the largest synagogues in Europe.

The country is a model of interfaith harmony, where the nation embraces and protects its Jewish community – the largest in the Muslim-majority world, and which has lived there since the 7th century at least.

Baku was one of the hubs of the Zionist movement during the Russian Empire in the late 19th century. Its first Hovevei Zion chapter was founded in 1891, followed by the establishment of the first Zionist organization in 1899. The short-lived Democratic Republic of Azerbaijan (1918–1920) saw the continuation of the movement, which was marked by the founding of the Jewish Popular University in 1919, periodicals published in Yiddish, Hebrew, Judeo-Tat and Russian, as well as a number of schools, social clubs, charitable organizations, and cultural institutions.

Prior to the meeting with Hoenlein, Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev had met with the president of the Conference of European Rabbis, Rabbi Pinchas Goldschmidt, during the Munich Security Conference. President Aliyev, who has been targeted by Iranian propaganda due to his overt ties with Israel, emphasized to Rabbi Goldschmidt that close relations with the Jewish people are part of "the Azerbaijani way of life."

As recently publicized, hundreds of members of the Conference of European Rabbis will arrive in Baku this November for their large biennial conference. The rabbis will visit local synagogues and meet with representatives of different Jewish communities across the country.

Azerbaijan has seven synagogues: three in Baku, two in Quba, and two in Oghuz. A new synagogue opened in Baku in 2010, and is now one of the largest synagogues in Europe.

The local Jewish residents see the Muslim country as a model of interfaith harmony, where the nation embraces and protects its Jewish community – the largest in any Muslim country in the world - which has existed in the region since the 7th century, as far as is known.

Baku was one of the hubs of the Zionist movement during the Russian Empire in the late 19th century. Its first Hovevei Zion chapter was founded in 1891, followed by the establishment of the first Zionist organization in 1899. The short-lived Democratic Republic of Azerbaijan (1918–1920) saw the continuation of the movement, which was marked by the founding of the Jewish Popular University in 1919, periodicals published in Yiddish, Hebrew, Judeo-Tat and Russian, as well as a several schools, social clubs, charitable organizations, and cultural institutions.

The signs of a flourishing Azerbaijani-Israeli friendship abound, but a rabbinical conference in a Muslim country is a miracle.

It was recently reported that hundreds of European rabbis will be attending the Conference of European Rabbis this fall, which is scheduled to take place in Baku between November 12 and November 15 at the invitation of Azerbaijan's President Ilham Aliyev. According to the reports in the media, about 500 rabbis are expected to attend the event and they will meet with local representatives of the Mountain Jewish, Georgian and Ashkenazi communities, in addition to visiting Azerbaijani synagogues.

Azerbaijan has seven synagogues: three in Baku, two in Quba and two in Oghuz, with a Jewish communal center also existing in Ganja.

The fact that Azerbaijan is hosting this event is another <u>sign of the flourishing friendship</u> between Israel, world Jewry and Azerbaijan. Today, Baku supplies Israel with almost half of its energy needs and 70 percent of Azerbaijan's arms are said to be produced by Israel. However, the friendship between Azerbaijan and Israel is not just strategic. It is not just about an exchange of arms for energy security. It is about a strong people-to-people bond between both peoples.

The Azerbaijanis are one of the few Muslim nations that waves Israeli flags. It is one of the few Muslim countries where there is no anti-Semitism and Jews can proudly don kippahs and Star of David necklaces, without fear. The Azerbaijani nation prides itself on having a rich multi-culturalism policy, which gives equal respect to all faiths and religions living in Azerbaijan.

When I was in Guba, I witnessed how the Azerbaijanis restored synagogues that the Soviets had abused and transformed one of them into the Mountain Jewish Museum, the only of its kind in the world, documenting the rich history of the Mountain Jewish people in the Caucasus region.

Azerbaijan's respect for the Jewish people led to the creation of a strong friendship between Israel and Azerbaijan. "Today, we are at the peak of our bilateral relationship, with a strong will to deepen and expand this friendship and cooperation," Elchin AMirbayov, representative of the President of Azerbaijan for special assignments," told JNS in an interview. "It is one of the rare cases in which we don't see any clouds. What you see is the tip of the iceberg. It's multi-fold, vibrant and constantly expanding."

In recent days, Rabbi Zamir Isayev reported, "The only kosher restaurant in Azerbaijan "Rimon" was officially launched! Address: Uzeyir Hajibeyli 74." This comes after the number of flights by Azerbaijan Airlines between Baku and Tel Aviv was raised from five to seven. As Israelis go out on holiday, many Israelis are expected to go to Baku this summer, and efforts have been made to make it easier for Israelis to travel to Azerbaijan.



Righteous Jews urge pro-Azeri Rabbis to cancel planned conference in Baku



Shortly after I wrote a column two weeks ago condemning European pro-Azerbaijan Rabbis for planning to hold a conference in Baku, I was pleasantly surprised to receive an email from 18 prominent individuals, most of whom are Jewish, including eight righteous Rabbis, who condemned the trip to Azerbaijan and called for its cancellation.

In a letter addressed to the Chief Rabbi Sir Ephraim Mirvis of the UK, the 18 signatories wrote: "We earnestly seek to initiate dialogue with you to appeal the decision of the Conference of European Rabbis and ensure that this conference does not go ahead in a country that is so opposed to the core values of Judaism and the teachings of the Torah." The letter quoted Prof. James Russell of Harvard University, who recently wrote: "It takes bullets to kill people, but indifference pulls the trigger."

The letter described "the grave humanitarian catastrophe unfolding in Artsakh" caused by Azerbaijan's blockade of the Berdzor (Lachin) Corridor, the only route linking Artsakh to Armenia, thus risking the starvation of 120,000 Artsakh Armenians. The letter stated that Azerbaijan is a country "widely recognized for having one of the lowest rankings in the world for upholding political rights and civil liberties."

This group of righteous Jews wrote: "We are saddened that this prominent organization that represents so many Jewish people across Europe is, by choosing to host their conference in Baku, supporting the Azeri government rather than standing up for human rights and living and breathing the lesson of the Shoah – 'never again.' While we acknowledge and appreciate the freedom that Jews can enjoy in Azerbaijan, the fact that these same inalienable rights do not extend to other minorities and religions in the country gives us cause to worry about how long Jews will be able to enjoy freedom in what is otherwise a totalitarian government in the Muslim world...Despite numerous international appeals and the decision of the International Court of Justice, the authorities of Azerbaijan have callously ignored calls to lift the blockade, disregarding the agreement signed in November 2020 by Azerbaijan, Armenia and Russia regarding unimpeded traffic through the Lachin Corridor."

Charny, the director of the Institute on the Holocaust and Genocide in Jerusalem, and Freedman, a Jerusalembased educator and Orthodox Rabbi, stated that they "say in the clearest terms possible that in our eyes, this

rabbinic letter misrepresents the facts, misunderstands the fundamental moral significance of the Holocaust, and misses a major pillar of Jewish ethics."

Charny and Freedman then enlightened the pro-Azeri Rabbis about the true meaning of the terms Holocaust and genocide: "In the Encyclopedia of Genocide, the word 'holocaust' was used to refer to the Armenian Holocaust in 1909, and even earlier in other contexts, and the word 'genocide' was coined in 1942 by a Polish Jewish lawyer, Raphael Lemkin, to describe the crime that had been committed against the Armenian people by Turkey, and that was then being committed by Germany against the Jews." The entry on the topic in the encyclopedia ends with the following conclusion: "the word (holocaust) belongs historically to all people's suffering, and certainly that it not become a basis for excluding the suffering of any other people."

Charny and Freedman described the pro-Azeri Rabbis' "claim that any contemporary comparison of the suffering of people is a desecration of the holy memory of the Holocaust, and a belittling of the Jewish people's suffering is itself an absurd desecration of Holocaust memory."

Charny and Freedman explained: "What the European Rabbis' letter does is to cynically weaponize the memory of the Holocaust in order to enable the infliction of mass suffering. After all, these Rabbis do not deny that 120,000 residents of Artsakh are in danger of starvation because of the blockade imposed by Azerbaijan. They do not deny that Azerbaijan is using mass starvation as a tactic for political gain. But by silencing Armenian criticism of Azerbaijan's actions, they are the ones who cynically use the 'Holocaust card' for political purposes."

Charny and Freedman concluded their statement: "The decision of these Rabbis to raise their voices on the side of the oppressor is a desecration of Holocaust memory and of Jewish values. In the spirit of this season of repentance, we call on the Conference of European Rabbis, or at the very least, on individual rabbinic members of conscience, to have the moral courage to remember their rabbinic duty, and retract their decision."

Righteous Jews urge pro-Azeri Rabbis to cancel planned conference in Baku

Shortly after I wrote a column two weeks ago condemning European pro-Azerbaijan Rabbis for planning to hold their conference in Baku, I was pleasantly surprised to receive an email from 18 mostly Jewish prominent individuals, including eight righteous Rabbis, who condemned the trip to Azerbaijan and called for its cancellation.

In a letter addressed to the Chief Rabbi Sir Ephraim Mirvis of the UK, the 18 signatories wrote: "We earnestly seek to initiate dialogue with you to appeal the decision of the Conference of European Rabbis and ensure that this conference does not go ahead in a country that is so opposed to the core values of Judaism and the teachings of the Torah." The letter quoted Prof. James Russell of Harvard University who recently wrote: "It takes bullets to kill people, but indifference pulls the trigger."

The tentacle of the Armenian cuttlefish caught in yet another lie and manipulation about Azerbaijan and Israel has been grasped tenaciously by rabbis all around the world. More than 1,500 rabbis from across the United States recently signed a letter in support of accepting refugees, demonstrating the American Jewish community's commitment to the safety and dignity of those in need. The big news is that similarly, rabbis from around the world are uniting to speak out against the demonization of Azerbaijan and the use of the Holocaust theme by Armenian propaganda.

With the web of Armenian lies on the global map, since May 2023, pro-Armenian activists in Israel have been disseminating left-liberal materials in Israeli and Jewish-American media outlets calling for the withdrawal of support for Azerbaijan. The main argument is that Jews, who survived the Holocaust, are now allegedly becoming "complicit in the genocide" of Armenians in Garabagh. Thus, there is an attempt to put pressure on the Israeli leadership to abandon its military-strategic partnership with Azerbaijan.

The Armenian lobby in the United States is a diverse coalition of individuals and groups seeking to influence US foreign policy in favor of Armenia, Armenians, or Armenian politics. The lobby's main goal is for the United States to recognize the Armenian genocide, but it has not been able to fully exert its influence, as the Turkish lobby has until recently successfully lobbied against it.

In the US, the Armenian lobby is formed almost exclusively by domestic organizations such as the Armenian National Committee of America and the Armenian Assembly of America, the largest and most influential Armenian-American organization in the US, engaged in public affairs (to sow lies) and government relations (to have pressure in promoting the Armenian agenda).

These organizations have similar pro-Armenian lobbying goals, which are mainly to improve US relations with Armenia in terms of aid (propaganda), block aid to Turkiye and Azerbaijan, and the ultimate goal of recognizing the Armenian genocide. The influence of the Armenian lobby can be judged by its concentration in a few congressional districts, such as California's 30th congressional district. According to the 2000 census, one-third of the Armenian-American community lived in just 5 districts in the 106th Congressional District.

The Armenian lobby in Israel continues to pressure the Israeli leadership to abandon friendly relations with Azerbaijan in their agenda of propaganda about the alleged "genocide of Armenians in Garabagh", as well as to abandon military-strategic partnership and economic partnership. The Armenian lobby is not a decree for Israel and Azerbaijan.

Turkiye, a close ally of Azerbaijan, called on Yerevan to "stop provocations" against Baku and focus on peace talks and cooperation with its neighbor. US Secretary of State Anthony Blinken also called for "an immediate halt to any military action", adding that "there can be no military solution to the conflict". Russia also expressed "extreme concern" over the intensified fighting, while the European Council said it was "ready to make efforts to prevent further escalation."

Rabbi Zsolt Balla of Saxony, Germany, joined a group of influential rabbis around the world in condemning the demonization of Azerbaijan and the use of the Holocaust theme by Armenian propaganda.

"I join my fellow rabbis and share their opinion that using the Holocaust theme as a tool to demonize Azerbaijan and distort the situation in the region is wrong," Balla said in a post on his Facebook page.

Balla's statement was in response to a joint statement by the Rabbinical Council of America, the Rabbinical Centre of Europe, and the Conference of European Rabbis condemning the use of the Holocaust as a propaganda tool in the ongoing conflict between Armenia and Azerbaijan.

Armenians are digging a deep hole for themselves. The statement notes that the Holocaust should never be used as a tool to demonize any people and that using the Holocaust as a propaganda tool is an insult to the memory of the millions of Jews killed in the Holocaust

Balla's statement is significant because he is the first rabbi to be appointed to military service in Germany in almost a century. His appointment is seen as a symbol of the resurgence of Jewish life in Germany, as well as evidence of the country's commitment to fighting anti-Semitism and extremism. Balla's announcement is a reminder that the Holocaust should never be used as a propaganda tool and that it is the responsibility of all people to ensure that the memory of the Holocaust is respected and honored.

On 25 August 2023, Baku-based Rabbi Zamir Isayev posted a video message on his Facebook page addressed to all Jews around the world in Hebrew and English. In the first two days, major Jewish media not only published the text of the message but also supported it.

The video message provided documentary evidence that Azerbaijan's accusation of "genocide of Armenians in Garabagh" is pure fiction. It also called on Jews around the world to oppose the demonization of Azerbaijan and the use of the Holocaust theme by Armenian propaganda.

The figures show that Armenia is the second most anti-Semitic country in Europe and the third in the world after the Middle East and North Africa.

Israel has not officially recognized the "armenian genocide". This issue has been repeatedly raised in the Israeli Knesset, but each time the adoption of a relevant resolution was postponed.

A group of 50 leading European rabbis sign a joint letter condemning the Armenian leadership for using Holocaust rhetoric in a campaign against Azerbaijan

Protests erupted this week across the European Union, the United States, and Muslim countries against the constant use of the Holocaust as a propaganda tool by the Armenian government.

A group of 50 leading European rabbis (RCE) signed a joint letter on Wednesday condemning the Armenian leadership for using **Holocaust rhetoric** in a campaign against its neighbor, Azerbaijan.

The letter followed recent interviews and statements by Armenian leaders about the conflict with Azerbaijan over the disputed Nagorno-Karabakh region.

"In a recent interview by Prime Minister Pashinyan to AFP, the Armenian leader drew comparisons between Nazi-created ghettos and the Holocaust, and what Azerbaijan is currently doing in the conflicted region," the RCE press service said in a statement.

This joint letter by European rabbis was in response to an article written by Rabbi Zamir Isayev, head of the Sepharadi-Georgian community in Baku. He cited shocking examples of Armenian officials' use of terms such as "Holocaust" and "ghetto," and who published a video comparing **Nazi atrocities** to the current social media photos of Armenians in the separatist enclave in Azerbaijani Karabakh.

Rabbi Isayev explained to *i24NEWS* how the ethnic Armenians are "claiming that they are 'dying like Jews in the ghettos from starvation."

But the Rabbi said, "They also post Instagram stories of weddings with huge cakes, seek to hire extra staff for restaurants, and advertise discounted shish-kebabs."

"Officials in the enclave, who have blocked the road used by the Azerbaijani government to bring all the necessary products, claim that it is better to die than to accept 'Hitler's handouts'," Rabbi Isayev continued, adding that Armenian claims of "famine" in the enclave echo the "Palestinian genocide" narrative of which Israel is falsely accused.

Isayev, who is an Israeli citizen and served in the IDF, noted that "Iran has been pushing the 'genocide' theme with all its might, spreading lies and fabricated images, accusing us of 'starving millions of Palestinians in Gaza."

"The Iranians have gone to international organizations with delusional demands for sanctions on Israel, which has fought such lies for decades, publishing photos of the gap in the quality of life in between the majority of the population in Gaza and its wealthy local leadership. Today, Azerbaijan is in the exact same situation: not a single piece of unbiased media emerges from the enclave. Social media, though, reveals a completely different picture."

Isayev's article received the support of 30 rabbis around the world, including Rabbi Aryeh Ralbag, head of the Union of Orthodox Rabbis of the United States and Canada; Rabbi Abraham Weill of Strasbourg and the Rhineland in France; Rabbi of the Caucasian community in the world Yaniv Naftaliev; Rabbi of Poland Mordechai Schudrich; Chief Rabbi of the Jewish Community of Vienna Jaron Engelmayer; Rabbi Eliyahu Hamara, founder of the Latin American Rabbinical Conference and president of the Argentine Israelite Mutual Association (AMIA); Zsolt Balla, the state Rabbi of Saxony and Federal Military Rabbi of Bundeswehr; Chief Rabbi at Geneva Izhak Dayan; Senior Rabbi of the S&P Sephardi Community of the UK Joseph Dweck; Chief Rabbi of Belgium Avraham Gigi, and many others.

Two more letters condemning the use of the Holocaust by Armenian officials were written by rabbis from Muslim countries and the American "Israel Heritage Foundation," established by Holocaust survivors.

It should be noted that 500 rabbis from the EU are planning to visit Baku in November 2023 for the biennial congress of the Conference of European Rabbis, which will be held at the invitation of Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev, who will act as the honorary host.

Synagogue vandalized in Armenia, apparently over Israeli-Azeri ties

'The Jews are the sworn enemies of the Armenian state,' reads text that circulates after red paint poured on Yerevan's only Jewish center

Unidentified individuals poured red paint on the façade of a synagogue in Armenia in an attack that appeared to be connected to Israeli weapon sales to Azerbaijan.

Following the incident Tuesday outside the Mordechay Navi Jewish Religious Center in Yerevan, Armenia, a text began circulating in pro-Armenian social media pages, describing the incident as retaliation for Israel's sale of drones and other arms to Azerbaijan and the recent criticism by dozens of rabbis of rhetoric by Armenian officials, who equated the Holocaust to Azerbaijan's actions against Armenian troops and civilians.

"The vandalism of the World Jewish Center in Armenia is distressing,"

In the antisemitic text that circulated in pro-Armenian channels, the authors wrote: "The Jews are the enemies of the Armenian nation, complicit in Turkish crimes and the regime of Aliyev, stained with the blood of the Republic of Armenia and Artsakh." Ilham Aliyev is the president of Azerbaijan. Artsakh is the name of the pro-Armenian government of the disputed Nagorno-Karabakh region, which Azerbaijan captured last month in a military campaign.

"The Jewish state provides weapons to Aliyev's criminal regime, and Jews from America and Europe actively support him. Turkey, Aliyev's regime, and the Jews are the sworn enemies of the Armenian state and people," the text also reads.

Israel buys a substantial part of its petrol from Azerbaijan, a Muslimmajority that shares a border with Iran. It also sells drones and other advanced weapons to Azerbaijan.

The antisemitic text also references a letter recently cosigned by dozens of rabbis, many of them from Chabad, who criticized Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan for equating Azerbaijani actions with those of the Nazis during the Holocaust. His remarks belittle the "terrible suffering experienced by the victims of the horrific Holocaust and the Jewish people at large," the rabbis wrote.

"If Jewish rabbis in the United States and Europe continue to support Aliyev's regime, we will continue to burn their synagogues in other countries. Every rabbi will be a target for us. No Israeli Jew will feel safe in these countries," the text circulating in pro-Armenian channels reads.

The World Jewish Center in Armenia's capital, Yerevan, was vandalized on Tuesday night in an act thought to be directly related to Israel's growing relations with neighboring adversary Azerbaijan.

The Nagorno-Karabakh enclave in Azerbaijan, historically inhabited by ethnic Armenian Christians, has been at the center of a longstanding conflict between Azerbaijan and Armenia.

The improved relations between Israel and Azerbaijan prompted supporters of the Armenian separatist government in Nagorno-Karabakh to target the Jewish center in Yerevan.

The attackers issued a statement saying: "The Jews are the enemies of the Armenian nation, complicit in Turkish crimes and the regime of [Azerbaijan President Ilhan] Aliyev. The Jewish state provides weapons to Aliyev's criminal regime, and Jews from America and Europe actively support him. Turkey, Aliyev's regime, and the Jews are the sworn enemies of the Armenian state and people."

They added: "If Jewish rabbis in the United States and Europe continue to support Aliyev's regime, we will continue to burn their synagogues in other countries. Every rabbi will be a target for us. No Israeli Jew will feel safe in these countries."

He urged Armenian President Vahagn Khachaturyan to condemn the act and called for increased security measures for the Jewish community.

Goldschmidt expressed his solidarity with the Jewish community in Armenia and hoped they could peacefully observe the holiday of Sukkot.

According to World Jewish Congress estimates, Armenia is home to about 500-1,000 Jews, mostly of Ashkenazi origin, and some Mizrahi and Georgian Jews, localized in Yerevan.

An ethnically diverse country, Armenia has had a deep historical connection to Judaism. Today, the small Armenian Jewish community is able to practice freely but there have been several manifestations of antisemitism.

Russia exchanged views with the United States and the European Union on the situation in Nagorno-Karabakh ahead of the lightning military operation by Azerbaijan last month, Russian Foreign Ministry spokeswoman Maria Zakharova said on Wednesday.

Politico earlier reported that top officials from the US and the EU met their Russian counterparts in Turkey for emergency talks about Karabakh days before Azerbaijan launched its operation in the breakaway region.

"The US and EU approached us and asked us to hold a meeting," Zakharova told reporters. She said the sides exchanged views about the situation in Karabakh.

"There was nothing secret about this meeting; it was an ordinary exchange of views. We shall see how the West will present all this now," she said.

France's conspiracy in Armenia: ASALA, anti-Semitism and even beyond?

BAKU, Azerbaijan, October 4. The Armenian Secret Army for the Liberation of Armenia (ASALA), a terrorist organization, has claimed responsibility for an attack on a synagogue in Yerevan. The barbaric attack on the synagogue was carried out by the youth wing of ASALA. The synagogue was doused with liquid, and windows were smashed. A statement released by ASALA in this regard calls the attack "a successful intimidation operation against the world Jewish center in Yerevan".

"Jews are sworn enemies of Armenia and its people. This is a warning: our successful operation on October 3 in Yerevan is only the beginning. Every rabbi will be on our radar," the terrorist organization said in a statement.

ASALA also threatens war against Israeli Jews in Europe, America, Canada, and Georgia if the Israeli government continues to support Azerbaijan.

Meanwhile, Baku will host the biennial Conference of European Rabbis on November 12–15, upon the initiative of President Ilham Aliyev. About 500 rabbis are expected to attend the event. This organization unites more than 700 religious leaders from communities across Europe, making it the main orthodox rabbinical alliance. Founded in 1956, it is dedicated to protecting the rights of Jews in Europe. The conference is expected to focus on religious freedom and issues related to Jewish communities.

As they say, feel the difference. Jews in Azerbaijan have always felt themselves under the protection of the state; they enjoy all the benefits of Azerbaijan's development. Israel and Azerbaijan are comprehensively developing their relations. Whereas in Armenia, as we see, acts of vandalism and Judophobia take place. But France stubbornly does not want to pay attention to all these facts.

Moreover, former and current servicemen (mostly of Armenian origin) of the French Army and employees of French special services are sent to Armenia as instructors. At the same time, ASALA is being rehabilitated on the territory of France under the patronage of French special services, in particular French intelligence. There is information that terrorist training is conducted for future Armenian terrorists in special French schools.

And this is despite the terror committed by Armenian terrorists in the 1970s and 1980s of the last century! They orchestrated terrorist attacks in several French cities. It's worth a lot just to talk about the terrorist incident at Orly Airport! An explosion in front of the Turkish Airlines counter at Orly Airport in Paris occurred on July 15, 1983, when a sizable bag packed with explosives detonated. The immediate death toll was four. There were a total of 55 injuries and 8 fatalities.

How did it end? With French disgrace. The French government and Armenian terrorists reportedly reached a secret agreement in January 1982, according to which the French authorities were to exert pressure on Türkiye regarding the fictitious "Armenian genocide" and to permit Armenian terrorists free access to French airports in exchange for a promise not to carry out terrorist acts on French soil. This agreement was made public by the international press.

Under this agreement, the four Armenian terrorists arrested in 1981 for the attack on the Turkish embassy received lenient sentences, and one of the ASALA leaders, Monte Melkonian, who had been imprisoned, was released. He eventually resurfaced in Karabakh and took part in the killing of Azerbaijani civilians. That was the French shame. That is why Paris, to this day, following that shameful collusion with Armenian terrorists, tries to put pressure on Azerbaijan and protects Armenia, where heinous crimes are committed and where Judeophobia and Azerbaijanophobia flourish.

It is clear that France had its own agenda regarding the Karabakh junta's presence on Azerbaijani territory. The concept dubbed "the second Armenian state" was vigorously supported in Paris. It is driven by the "crusades" strategy and deliberately emphasizes the religious aspect as a "argument" in favor of Armenia.

Moreover, the intelligence and security agencies of Armenia have been completely transferred under the curatorship of France. The process of militarization of Armenia by Paris is underway. ASALA is being revived; radical Armenians in France are being trained and recruited from the Armenian community in Lebanon.





Antisemitism in Armenia: Molotov cocktail thrown at country's only synagogue

On the morning of October 3, in the Armenian capital, Yerevan, the only synagogue in the country, Mordechai Navi, was attacked.

ASALA_Young took responsibility for the act of vandalism. The organization's telegram channel, created on the same day, published a video from the scene of the incident, where a man in a cap and hood can be seen pouring red paint on the walls of the synagogue and breaking out the windows.

Judging by the name and logo, ASALA_Young promotes the ideas of the Armenian Secret Army for Liberation of Armenia (ASALA), an Armenian paramilitary organization created in 1975 and recognized by the United States as terrorist.

According to the organization, the "act of intimidation" was prepared by ASALA_Young "to take revenge on Israel and world Jewry for supporting Azerbaijan".

In their Telegram message, the Armenian radicals promised to take revenge on Jews, including in European countries: "If Jewish rabbis in the USA and Europe continue to support the Aliyev regime, we will continue to burn their synagogues in other countries. Every rabbi will be under our guns... We will start a war against Israeli Jews in Europe, America, Canada, Georgia."

Israeli state radio Kan reported that the incident was not just an act of vandalism. The attackers threw a Molotov cocktail into the synagogue, planning to set it on fire, but for some reason the incendiary mixture did not ignite.

This is not the first provocation committed in Armenia against the Jewish minority over the past month.

On September 9, on the Jewish Sabbath, during prayer, an unknown Armenian burst into the same Mordechai Navi synagogue and began shouting curses and threats. Despite the incident, Yerevan authorities ignored the need to provide security to protect the only center of the Jewish religious community, although on September 17 the Israeli Ministry of Diaspora Affairs warned that (in Armenia)"there are concerns about... violent attacks against Jewish property in the near future."The day before the attack, on October 2, the Israeli think tank Begin-Sadat Center wrote: "The restoration of Azerbaijan's sovereignty over the entire territory of Karabakh triggered a wave of anti-Semitism in Armenia."And the Israeli English-language publication The Jerusalem Post has been talking about "systemic anti-Semitism" of Armenians since 2019.

If the Armenian authorities had taken the necessary measures, ASALA_Young members would hardly have been able to freely throw Molotov cocktails at a religious institution.

It is noteworthy that the Armenian law enforcement agencies are still silent about these events, although the head of the CER (Conference of European Rabbis) has already called on the President of Armenia to condemn the attack on the synagogue in Yerevan and "strengthen the security of the Jewish community."

The main reason for the surge in anti-Semitic sentiments in Armenia was the support of Azerbaijan from the Jewish people, which manifested itself in a recent large-scale media campaign by rabbis from around the world.

Since August 27, about 200 rabbis from Europe, the US, Canada, Latin America, the UK and Israel have actively opposed the use of the terms "Holocaust" and "genocide" by Armenian propaganda to demonize Azerbaijan.

On September 6, fifty rabbis from 19 European countries sent official letters to Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan and President Vahagn Khachaturian demanding an "immediate and complete" end to the use of the Holocaust theme by Armenian propaganda "for the sake of achieving any political goals." Copies of these appeals were sent to the presidents of the European Parliament and the European Commission.

A week and a half later, the largest rabbinical organization in Europe, RCE (Rabbinical Center of Europe), signed by 50 European rabbis, officially sent a similar letter to Israeli President Isaac Herzog, which resulted in widespread coverage in Israeli, Ukrainian and various European media.

In response to the actions of the organized Jewish community, the Armenian diaspora in Europe launched a pressure campaign against rabbis who participated in public statements or signed letters. In addition, Jewish citizens of Yerevan also began to come under pressure (according to the Israeli radio of Israel, Kan, there are only about 200 Jews left in Armenia).

On September 11, Baku rabbi Zamir Isaev called on the last Jews in Armenia to leave the country and move to Azerbaijan, where he guaranteed them citizenship and security.

Amid Nagorno-Karabakh conflict, Armenian synagogue defaced and local anger over Israeli arms sales to Azerbaijan grows

(JTA) — Vandals threw red paint on an Armenian synagogue on Tuesday, in the latest sign of increasing tensions between Armenia and Israel as Israeli arms sales have fueled Azerbaijan's offensive in the contested Nagorno-Karabakh region.

The paint was smeared on the Mordechay Navi Jewish Religious Center in Yerevan, what is thought to be the only synagogue in Armenia's capital city. Most estimates put the number of Jews in Armenia at a few hundred.

The Conference of European Rabbis — an organization of Orthodox rabbis led by the exiled former chief rabbi of Moscow, Pinchas Goldschmidt — tied the act of vandalism to posts it shared from a nationalist Armenian group that had circulated on pro-Armenian social media pages at the time.

"The Jews are the enemies of the Armenian nation, complicit in Turkish crimes and the regime of Aliyev, stained with the blood of the Republic of Armenia and Artsakh," one post read, referring to Azerbaijani President Ilham Aliyev.

"The Jewish state provides weapons to Aliyev's criminal regime, and Jews from America and Europe actively support him," the post continued, according to the Conference of European Rabbis, "If Jewish rabbis in the United States and Europe continue to support Aliyev's regime, we will continue to burn their synagogues in other countries. Every rabbi will be a target for us. No Israeli Jew will feel safe in these countries."

Despite that threat, the Armenian synagogue that was defaced was not burned on Tuesday, according to reports and photos from the scene.

Israel and Azerbaijan have developed close relations in recent years, as Azerbaijan provides Israel with approximately 40% of its oil resources. According to reports, Israel supplied up to 70% of Azerbaijan's military arsenal in the years leading up to 2020. The Associated Press reported on Thursday that Azerbaijani cargo planes were seen leaving Israel last month.

Israeli officials have said that the arms relationship is partly due to Azerbaijan's geographic proximity to Iran, a country that routinely calls for violence against Israel. "We have a strategic partnership to contain Iran," Arkady Mil-man, Israel's former ambassador to Azerbaijan, told the AP.

Over the past two weeks, more than 100,000 ethnic Armenians have fled Nagorno-Karabakh after Azerbaijani troops began fighting with Armenian rebels, reigniting of a conflict that flared in 2020 and left thousands of fighters dead. The region — which is part of Azerbaijan but has a population that is ethnically and culturally tied to Armenia — was also the site of a war in the 1990s, after the dissolution of the Soviet Union.

Armenian officials have begun to express concern over Israel's military support of Azerbaijan. "For us, it is a major concern that Israeli weapons have been firing at our people," Armenian Ambassador to Israel Arman Akopian told the AP. "I don't see why Israel should not be in the position to express at least some concern about the fate of people being expelled from their homeland."

Azerbaijan has also taken steps to to cultivate ties with global Jewish groups, including the Conference of European Rabbis, which is slated to hold a meeting in Baku in November. The Rabbinical Centre of Europe, a group of European rabbis associated with the Hasidic Chabad-Lubavitch movement, issued a statement last month condemning Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan for using the word "genocide" to describe the Nagorno-Karabakh conflict. Pashinyan also told Agence-France Presse that Azerbaijani troops have created "a ghetto" in the disputed region.

"Senior Armenian government officials... employed the language and comparisons that are appropriate solely to describe the deliberate, systematic and largest genocide in the history of mankind, which the Jewish people have been subjected to: The Holocaust," the statement read. "Such words as 'ghetto,' 'genocide,' 'Holocaust' and the like [are] in no uncertain terms inappropriate to be part of the jargon used in any kind of political disagreement. Usage of these terms belittles the terrible suffering experienced by the Holocaust victims and the entire Jewish people."

110 years ago, in 1913, Mendel Beilis, a Jewish factory manager in Kyiv faced false accusations of murdering a Christian boy. The Beilis trial was one of the most high-profile cases of a blood libel against Jews — a prejudice that goes back to ancient times and has cost the lives of countless Jewish people. The trial was followed by a series of pogroms throughout the Russian Empire, which in turn triggered a wave of emigration of Jews from Russia.

Today we are witnessing a disturbing revival of a centuries-old practice that has taken on more sophisticated forms.

This week, a number of major Western media outlets, including CNN, AP, The Globe and Mail,

ABCNews to name a few, simultaneously published materials suggesting that Israeli weapons played the
main role in Azerbaijan's retaking of its territory of Karabakh from the separatists.

Do not be deceived: behind the sanitised phrases lies the same sinister innuendo: because of the actions of the Jews, Christians have suffered once again, tens of thousands of whom are forced to leave their homes.

This resurgence of anti-semitism is damaging responsible journalism and threatening Jewish communities around the world. Recent events include an act of terrorism in Yerevan, where unknown assailants tried to burn the synagogue. Threats have also been made against Israeli Jews in Europe and America.

The Armenian Secret Army for the Liberation of Armenia (ASALA), an allegedly defunct terrorist organisation with a long history of violence, claimed responsibility for this heinous act. It is widely believed that the founding of ASALA was inspired by the murder of two Turkish diplomats on American soil: in 1973, an Armenian-American, Gurgen Yanikian, shot and killed the Turkish Consul General and Vice Consul in Santa Barbara.

This was not an isolated act of violence: in the 70s-90s Armenian terrorists killed Turkish diplomats and their family members in Los Angeles, in Sydney, Paris and other European cities, stating that their actions were in retaliation for the mass killing of Armenians in 1915 in the Ottoman Empire.

ASALA was armed and trained by the PLO (Palestinian Liberation Organization) terrorists during the 1980s in Lebanon and fought against Israel till 1982. So, there is nothing new in a message circulating on pro-Armenian social media, in which ASALA blames Jews and Israel for the events in Nagorno-Karabakh.

"The Jews are the enemies of the Armenian nation, complicit in Turkish crimes and the regime of Aliyev, stained with the blood of the Republic of Armenia and Artsakh," reads the text. It also provides an unambiguous clarification: "The Jewish state provides weapons to Aliyev's criminal regime, and Jews from America and Europe actively support him. Turkey, Aliyev's regime, and the Jews are the sworn enemies of the Armenian state and people."

The text also makes reference to a letter signed by dozens of European rabbis who criticised Armenian Prime Minister Nikol Pashinyan for equating Azerbaijani actions with those of the Nazis during the Holocaust. "If Jewish rabbis in the United States and Europe continue to support Aliyev's regime, we will continue to burn their synagogues in other countries. Every rabbi will be a target for us.

No Israeli Jew will feel safe in these countries." Sapienti sat. Next month, on November 12-15, the Conference of European Rabbis' convention is set to meet in Baku, Azerbaijan. Threats have been made against the participating rabbis, including those who signed the petition criticising the Armenian PM. Given the past history of Armenian terrorism, they should not be taken lightly.

Against this background, the support the accusations of Armenian extremists receive from major. Western publications raises uncomfortable questions. Are they unwittingly or, worse, intentionally instigating the possibility of new pogroms in the 21st century? Jews fit the role of the Other perfectly, especially given the long tradition of blaming them for every misfortune, from child murder to crop failure.

The alliance of Jews with a traditionally Muslim country seems to further amplify this effect: the two favourite bogeymen of European Christian civilisation have given rise to the most heinous manifestations of xenophobia. In the twenty-first century, it is awkward to remind people about journalistic ethics, about the responsibility of media for the sentiments they seed in public opinion. Sadly, it appears that these reminders have to be repeated over and over again.
